Big Parade.

Several hundred Shriners, numerous bands and drum corps and Shrine patrols were in the parade which moved from the Consistory temple to the Shrine temple at 2:30 p. m. Main street was lined with spectators, and there were groups along other streets of the parade route.

A number of the stores closed yesterday afternoon, giving the proprietors and employees the opportunity of swelling the street crowds during the parade hour.

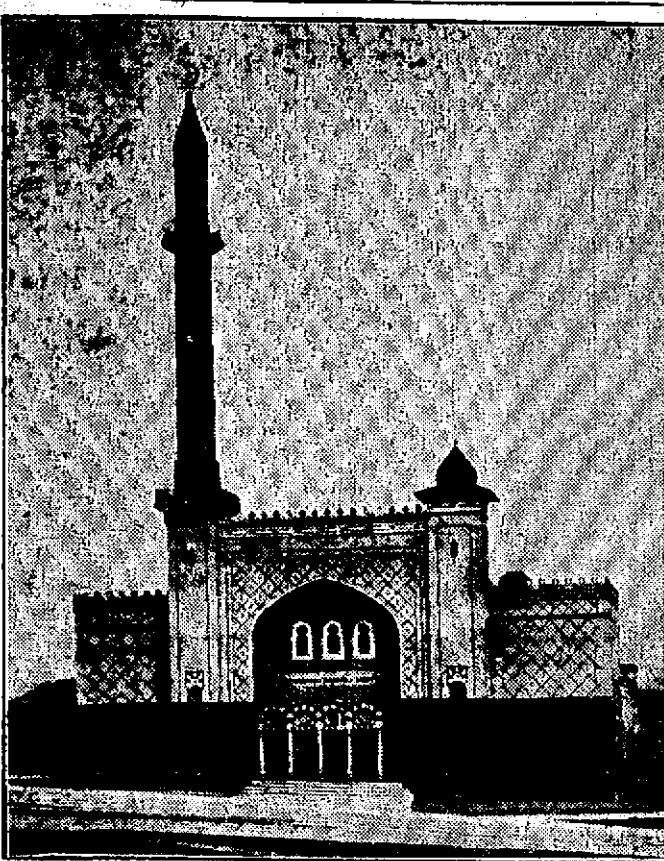
