Elizabeth W. Berry

Sept. 28, 1932 — Feb. 16, 1995

Elizabeth W. Berry of Corvallis, Ore., died of pancreatic cancer on Feb. 16, 1995, at her home. She was 62.

She was born in New York City, the daughter of John and Evelyn Wiley. Her family later moved to San Diego, Calif., where she graduated from San Diego High School.

Mrs. Berry attended Stanford University, earning a

bachelor's degree in English in 1954. She married John Robert Berry of Berkeley, Calif., in 1955; they moved to Corvallis in 1962, when her husband, a physician, joined the Corvallis Clinic. Mrs. Berry obtained a master's degree in English Education at OSU. She was a teacher at the Farm Home School from 1978 to 1984. She then joined the English Department of Crescent Valley High School, where she taught until the fall of 1992, helping design the school's international program.

Mrs. Berry was active in international affairs and traveled extensively. She and her family lived in Bombay, India for two years while her husband served as a medical administrator in the Peace Corps. She was one of 20 American educators who attended two U.S.-Soviet institutes in collaborative education sponsored by Educators for Social Responsibility. For several years she served as local chapter coordinator of this group. Mrs. Berry also helped organize the Corvallis Sister Cities Association, served on its board of directors, and was a past president. Her other interests include reading, music, backpacking, skiing, and conservation projects. She and her family have planted thousands of trees on private land. She especially cherished her family relationships, her creative work with her students, and her closeness to nature.

In addition to her husband, John, she is survived by two daughters, Katherine Berry of Helena and Susan B. Myers of Portland; two sons, Daniel J. Berry of Rochester, Minn. and James D. Berry of Portland; a sister, Martha W. Emmett of New York City; a brother, John R. Wiley of Whittier, Calif.; and three grandchildren.

A private gathering for her immediate family will be held at Mrs. Berry's home. Her ashes will be strewn among native dogwood trees on the family farm.

Mrs. Berry requested that any memorial gifts be made to the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library Foundation toward the purchase of children's books at the new Philomath Library.

Several backcountry trails will be rebuilt this summer

Stretches of several trails located in the backcountry of the Helena Ranger District of the Helena National Forest are in poor shape and will require major reconstruction. The work will consist of relocating some segments of the trails to avoid steep grades in the existing locations.

Trials proposed for major work this year include the Blackfoot Meadows Trail No. 329 and the Bison/Blackfoot Trail No. 328 in the Electric Peak Roadless Area south of Elliston. Montgomery Park Trail No. 301 in the Elkhorn Mountains southeast of Helena is also scheduled for major reconstruction.

The proposed work is scheduled to begin in mid-June and conclude by mid-October.

District Ranger Denis Hart welcomes public comments on these proposed trail projects. Comments should be submitted by April 1, to the Helena Ranger District, 2001 Poplar, Helena 59601. cord-Herald reads "The Smartest Ski Outfits on the Marysville Run Reflects all the 'know' of the White Stag Skier Stylist; has the lines, the details, the color appeal!" The picture features a larger-than-life woman gripping her skis, gazing boldly into the distance, sporting her White Stag "Logger Jack" ensemble.

In the midst of the second brown winter in as many years in the Helena area, it is looking like cold, snowy, rugged Montana winters have gone the way of the \$18 Sears ski package, the \$9 parka, and use of the word "togs."

Although Marysville never did become that destination resort, local skiers can still get their fix on Mount Belmont, at the area now known as the Great Divide. Three chair lifts, the first of which was installed in 1986, haul skiers all over the old mining territory, offering numerous opportunities, as a reporter put it in 1946, for "breaking one's neck on a pair of slats."
